God with us in our impatience and our hurry God still to come in futures yet to be written


God with us in the ordinary and mundane moments of our lives

Sunday 10th January Epiphany 1 The Baptism of Christ

10.0 a.m. Parish Communion (Hannah Cartwright presiding)

Genesis 1 God's creation is good.

Acts 19.1-7 Paul baptizes some disciples in Ephesus. They receive the Spirit.

Mark 1.4-11 John baptizes Jesus. God speaks from heaven: my beloved Son.

Sunday 17th January Epiphany 2

10.0 a.m. Parish Communion

1 Samuel 3.1-20 God calls the boy Samuel. Old man Eli faces retirement.

Psalm 139.1-9 Lord you have searched me out and known me.

(Revelation 5.1-10 A vision of heaven).

John 1.41-51 Nathaniel confesses Jesus as the Son of God, Messiah. Jesus promises a greater vision – heaven open and angels linking heaven and earth through him, the Son of Man.

Sunday 24th January Epiphany 3

10.0 a.m. Parish Communion

Genesis 14.17-20 Abraham (called Abram back then) is blessed by Melchizedek, who brings bread and wine. Abraham tithes a tenth of his income and sets it aside for God.

Revelation 19.6-10 More visions and blessings and worship by this fearsome Christian prophet.

John 2.1-11 Water into wine at Cana – the disciples behold Christ's glory revealed.

6.30 p.m. Evening prayer

Sunday 31st January Epiphany 4

10.0 a.m. Parish Communion

Deuteronomy 18.15-20 (or 19) A prophet like Moses will come – we must listen to him.

Revelation 12.1-5 A vision from heaven of a mother and child. The forces of evil (a red dragon!) try to destroy him and fail. He will rule, bringing God's kingdom.

Mark 1.21-28 Jesus' ministry of healing and teaching – something new, spoken with God's authority. The demons can't handle it and are exorcised.
